I went to visit one of our members at a rehab facility. Her room was empty. I walked to the nurses desk to ask if she might be doing physical therapy. No one was at the desk. It was around lunch time so I considered the possibility that the person I was looking for might be eating. And there she was.

I always feel bad about interrupting someone's meal. Eating well is an important part of the healing process. But I walked over and said, "Hello" and pulled up a chair. We chatted briefly and caught up on how she was doing. After a few moments I asked if she would like to pray. She said yes, but so did the woman sitting beside her at the table. So I prayed for the woman I knew well and for the stranger seated alongside her. They both thanked me for praying with them.

It is a gift to pray for one another. We often think of prayer as that communication that draws us closer to God. It does that, but it also strengthens the connections with those closest to us. That is why prayer has such an important place in our worship. It conveys both sides of those relationships, reminding us of our connection with God, but also strengthening the community relationships around us. We pray for those who are sick or hospitalized, for those who are recuperating, for weary caregivers, for those who are grieving, for those facing uncertainties. We pray for people we know by name and for people we will likely never meet. Prayer invites us to look around the world and to see the needs of those in distant places.

In the pews, we have prayer cards that people can fill out. I was touched the Sunday one of our youth filled it out saying to "pray for his mom who was sick." And there are the sometimes playful prayer requests, one member naming several family members needing prayer and ending by saying, "and for 3 assorted other ne'er-do-wells." Ne'er-do-wells need our prayers as well.

I recall that a few years ago I asked for your prayers on a Sunday morning for a grandson who was born prematurely. People still ask how George is doing and continue to pray for him. I appreciate that.

It is a great gift of the church to be able to pray for one another.

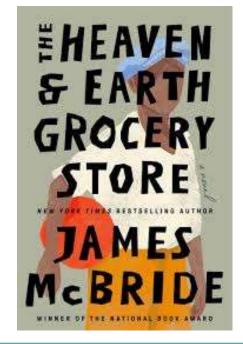

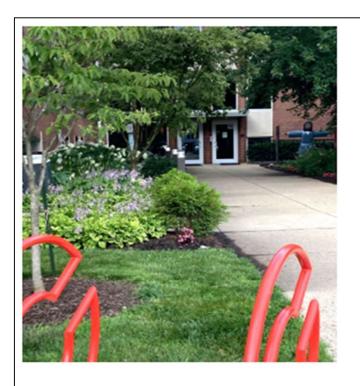

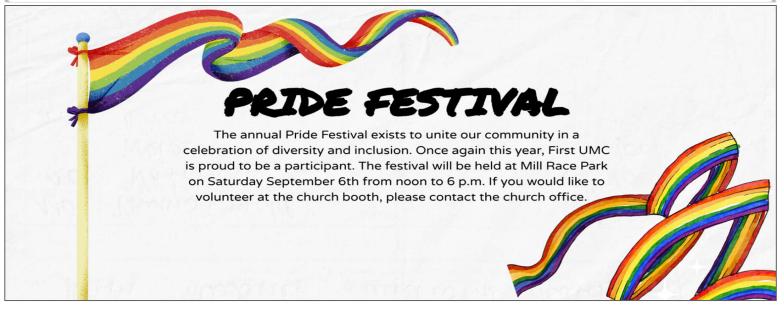
We hope you enjoy the beauty of the church grounds!
