

While reading a book of early Indiana history, I came upon the story of Amory Kinney. Kinney (1793-1859) was the son of a Congregational minister and become an attorney. He began his career in Vincennes before moving to Terre Haute. He served three terms in the Indiana House of Representatives and is credited with helping to codify the laws for free public education in our state.

Along with this work, Kinney was a staunch abolitionist. He argued several cases that led to the emancipation of enslaved people in Indiana. In one case tried in Vincennes, Kinney represented Polly Strong, an enslaved woman. Kinney argued that she should be freed because she was born after the Northwest Ordinance which prohibited slavery and because the Indiana Constitution prohibited slavery. In the initial case, the court ruled in favor of the slaveholder. Polly Strong was forced to remain a slave.

Kinney and his colleagues appealed the case to the Indiana Supreme Court where, on July 22, 1820, they were victorious. Polly was free. Not everyone was overjoyed. After the verdict, Kinney was attacked by a pro-slavery mob where he suffered serious injuries.

Sometime thereafter, Kinney was in Vincennes on a Sunday morning. He entered the stately Presbyterian Church to worship. Once he sat in a pew, several of those seated nearby got up and sat somewhere else.

I don't know if the pastor had prepared a specific message that morning, but if he did, the message was discarded after witnessing these events. The pastor responded with a sermon supporting Kinney's work and filled with references to the respectful treatment of all God's children.

A couple of takeaways from this historical account. First, it can be lonely to do the right thing. With the advantage of 200 years, we can look at this story and find support for Kinney and his important work. But at the time, it was sometimes met with disdain and even outright opposition. Doing the right thing can be lonely, but it is the right thing to do.

Secondly, I find it meaningful that the pastor stood with Kinney, unpopular though it was with the congregation. The book didn't say what happened after that sermon. I wonder whether his tenure there wasn't cut short soon thereafter. But he chose to speak up for justice. He let Kinney know that he was not alone and that not only encouraged the young attorney, but I would like to believe it empowered others to do the same.

I hope that story will provide a bit of inspiration to each of us, wherever God is calling us to action. As the prophet Micah put it, "What does the Lord require of us, but to do justice, to love kindness and to walk humbly with our God."

#### **FOUNDATION UPDATE**

The First United Methodist Church Columbus Indiana Foundation, Inc. was established in 1991 by combining four legacy donations and continues to grow through individual and estate donations. This provides a permanent source of financial support for the ongoing ministries of the church.

The funds are for ministries NOT funded in the annual operating budget.

#### The Foundation consists of 5 funds:

- · Endowment Fund (\$1,193,835) is the protected principle that is not used. 90% of earnings are available annually for transfer to Property and Service to Others Funds at the discretion of the Board. For 2024, \$32,731 was transferred to the Property Fund.
- · Property Fund (\$121,164) used for capital improvement and major/infrequent repairs.
- · Service to Others Fund (\$50,330) used to support programs addressing growth, outreach, and missions over and above the regular obligations of the church.
- · Mary G. McCullough Trust (\$721,765) annual earnings are forwarded to the church as a perpetual offering for the support of the general ministry. For 2024, \$24,609 was transferred to the church.
- · Lloyd & Susan Douglas Fund (\$192,371) newly received funding with the annual earnings being used where needed.

#### Projects recently funded by the Foundation:

- · Sidewalk Repairs (\$11,071)
- · Boiler Replacement (\$98,011)
- · Pew Cushion Replacement (\$40,000)

Church members and committees are encouraged to request a grant for any type of property or service project. Request for Funds forms are available in the church office.


