

Dear Friend,

This will be an unusual way to frame the Advent season but let me offer this suggestion. Think of the month of December as an opportunity to practice good boundaries. Give yourself permission to say "yes" or "no" to the many expectations without any added guilt.

Advent is a busy season. There are decorations to put up, cookies to bake, parties to host and attend, cards to mail, gifts to purchase, etc. And if that isn't enough, we often put pressure on ourselves to do these things with perfection. We even describe it that way. We want to find the perfect gift. We want the cookies to turn out perfectly golden-brown. So much pressure.

And I fear that the church may not always help. In this newsletter you are going to find a multitude of things happening. I hope you will sample the things that will make your Advent a holy and meaningful season. But don't feel like you must do everything. Perhaps one of the greatest forms of idolatry is the presumption that everything depends upon us. It doesn't. Give yourself permission to participate where it is helpful, but don't feel like you have to do everything.

Here are a few bits of advice regarding setting boundaries. Don't be motivated by guilt. If you bake fewer cookies this year, it will still be ok. If all the decorations don't make it up, Christmas will still come. If the cards are not on time, it won't be the end of the world. Do what you can.

When faced with the many demands upon your time, leave room for surprises and serendipity. It was not on the agenda of the shepherds to leave their flocks late that evening. But they heard a message from angels and went to investigate. Their curiosity was rewarded. Leave some room in your busy schedule to experience wonder, surprise and maybe a bit of unexpected joy.

Be good to yourself in this season. Chase those stars in the night sky and listen for angels nudging you in unexpected directions. Give yourself permission to sit quietly and listen to your favorite carols. Make room for a bit of wonder and beauty.
